

Overview of Applied Behavior Analysis

- 1. <u>Scientific methodology</u> used to understand (and modify) behavior in their environment
 - Behavior: any action or skill
 - Environment: any physical or social event that can change or be changed by one's behavior





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- 2. Based on the laws of Operant Conditioning

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THE BEHAVIOR	+ R	- R
Happens	POSITIVE	NEGATIVE
More often	REINFORCEMENT	REINFORCEMENT
THE BEHAVIOR	+ P	- P
Happens	POSITIVE	NEGATIVE
Less often	PUNISHMENT	PUNISHMENT





SURSTRACT OR



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 - Behavior: any action or skill
 - Environment: any physical or social event that can chan behavior
- 2. Based on the laws of Operant Conditioning
- 3. Effective for a variety of behaviors and populations

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- 2. Behaviors can be systematically shaped through modifying the environment/responses to behavior *before* and *after* the behaviors occurs








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- 2. Behaviors can be systematically shaped through modifying the environment/responses to behavior *before* and *after* the behaviors occurs



3. Goal: increase adaptive/appropriate behaviors; decrease interfering behaviors





ABA Components

- Specific Assessments (e.g., functional behavior assessment, language, adaptive)
- Antecedent Interventions
- Positive Reinforcement
- Behavior Reduction Strategies (e.g., extinction, punishment)
- Modeling
- Shaping and Chaining
- Naturalistic Teaching Strategies
- Prompting
- Self-management
- Generalization and Maintenance
- Social Skills Strategies





ABA for Autism: Why so Synonymous?

- 1. ASD is a complex neurodevelopmental disorder
 - Significant social communication deficits
 - More often than not traditional teaching methods are not helpful
 - May exhibit behaviors/impairments that are difficult to address with traditional parenting or therapeutic strategies





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- 3. Parents and practitioners have advocated out the ying-yang





ABA and Autism

- 1. Empirically supported treatment for core deficits in ASD
 - Well-established evidenced base for ages preschool to adults dating back to the 1970s
 - Produce improvements in communication, social relationships, play, self care, school, employment, and etc.
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- 2. Early and Intensive Behavior Intervention (EIBI)
 - Based on work of Lovaas in the 1980s
 - Under age 4 years
 - 20-40 hours per week for 1-3 years
 - Significant improvements in learning/IQ, communication, and adaptability
 - Majority of children in sample could be mainstreamed for some all of classes





How to Receive ABA?

- Center-Based Program
- Home-Based Program
- School-Based Program
- Parent Training/Clinic-Based Program
- Telehealth





Who Can Provide ABA?

- 1. Board Certified Behavior Analysts (BCBA)
- 2. Licensed Psychologist with training in ABA (only outpatient based)
- 3. Red Flags
 - Providers without appropriate education
 - Providers who do not have appropriate supervision
 - Therapist who do not include parent training







How Do Parents Pay for ABA?

- 1. Indiana presently has Medicaid mandated ABA for ASD
- 2. Some private insurance companies pay for home and centerbased programs
- 3. Self-pay
- ABA-based outpatient behavioral therapy can be covered by insurance if provider is state licensed (which BCBAs in Indiana are not)
- 5. School (very rare/extreme circumstances)
